A Letter From The Chairman

I am very honoured to be following in Fiona Mackenzie's footsteps as chair of the PSBG. I bought my first Portlands back in 1982 when there were few to choose from. I had been lured towards them originally by Frank Bailey who persuaded me – rightly - that they would suit my steep field with its thin soil overlying oolitic limestone.

Since then I have kept a total of 16 different sheep breeds at Norwood, in Somerset, where I ran a mixed farm and in that time my little band of Portlands grew to a flock of over 25. They were mainly of Marsden origin, but I bought in rams from a number of other sources as the choice grew. During this time I was a card grader at a number of Rare Breeds Shows and Sales, and became a sheep judge, as well as serving on the RBST Council for some years.

Since selling my farm I have remained in touch with Portlands although I no longer keep them. I have judged at a number of shows and look forward to meeting you all on the rounds this year.

Saving a very rare breed, with specific qualities and characteristics such as the Portland is never easy, and even harder when all the emphasis in the mainstream farming world is on size and conformation. Wool and the special quality of grass-fed Portland meat remain the unique selling points and I look forward to playing my part in promotion and continuation of this special breed.

Changes to the Portland Breed Description and Breed Standard: Meeting of Judges and Card-Graders at Sherborne Show – 25 May.

As most members will now be aware, the Breed Description for Portlands in the Combined Flock Book has been amended following discussions with RBST. There are also consequential amendments to the PSBG Breed Standard. These changes were approved at the PSBG AGM in September 2014. An article explaining the changes was published in the Ark in autumn 2014 and is repeated below on page 6.

Cate Le Grice-Mack would like to invite Portland Judges and Card Graders to an informal meeting at the Sherborne Show, to be held on the Bank Holiday Monday 25th May to discuss the changes and consider any implications for breeders and graders. Breeders are also welcome. Cate proposes that those who are able to come gather at the showground following the final judging and showing, probably about 3pm or so, for about an hour.

Revision of CFB Breed Description for Portland Sheep

The conservation of rare breeds often involves finding a balance between the conflicting aims of preserving the purity of the breed with maintaining genetic diversity within the breed. This is a particular challenge for breeds which are numerically small. RBST and the Portland Sheep Breeders Group (PSBG) are pleased to announce that they have agreed amendments to the Breed Description for Portland Sheep in the Combined Flock Book with the aim of achieving that balance.

For several years the CFB Breed Description has differed from the Breed Standard for Portlands, which was adopted by RBST and PSBG in the 1990's. Following lengthy discussions with RBST, the PSBG membership recently approved the revisions to the CFB Breed Description and consequential amendments to the Breed Standard.

The primary concern in this debate was the registration of rams with black marks or patches. The former Breed Standard had required the disqualification of rams with black marks or patches. That was not reflected in the CFB Breed Description, which listed black marks or patches as an undesirable characteristic but did not provide for disqualification of rams. The new wording lists black marks or patches as an undesirable characteristic and provides for the reclassification in the C Category of the CFB of any sheep which exhibits a significant departure from the Breed Description or any major functional defect. This provision reflects the current CFB registration regulations, which in turn are designed to be consistent with the EU zootechnical regulations. A non-conforming animal born to two parents that are registered in the A Register will be registered in the C category if the breeder insists on registration. The progeny of an animal registered in the C category are not eligible for registration.

One significant aspect of the new CFB Breed Description for Portlands is the requirement that rams should be assessed more strictly than ewes. This reflects the fact that a ram is likely to have a much greater influence on the characteristics of the breeder's flock, and ultimately the national flock, than a single ewe. Portland breeders are therefore encouraged to refrain from registering and/or using rams with black marks or patches. By contrast, breeders may continue to register and use a ewe with a black mark or patch, if that ewe is otherwise sound. Any Portland which is predominantly black should not be registered or, at most, should be registered in the C category. Cate Le Grice Mack, the incoming chairman of PSBG, said, "The revised wording of the CFB Breed Description will help to preserve and promote the Portland breed. We are very pleased to have reached an agreement with RBST and we welcome the Trust's recent cooperation in resolving a complex issue."

Tom Beeston, CEO of RBST said, "It is important that RBST recognises the work done by the breeders and in preserving our rare breeds. This agreement on the CFB Breed Description demonstrates the benefit of a combined approach by RBST with the breed societies."

Black spots – The Final Word?

*If wool growing is your business, beware of barbed vegetation,

Reject any ram, however pure and white his wool,
if the tongue beneath his moist palate is black, for he'll breed
lambs with black-spotted fleeces – Reject, and look around for
another ram on the crowded sheep run.*

Vergil was a Roman poet who published a long treatise on agriculture around 29 BC. Book 3 covers animal husbandry. It appears that Roman shepherds had much in common with modern Portland breeders.
